Spotlight Series, continued from the cover

This year's Spotlight Series promises musical numbers, unsolved cold cases and how to spend a perfect day in the Bluegrass State.

All talks are on Thursdays at 7 pm at Bellevue's Callahan Community Center (322 Van Voast Ave, Bellevue, KY 41073). Register for each installment at cc-pl.org/spotlightseries-24.

Ahead of the series, we caught up with JT Townsend—author of *Queen City Gothic* and *Summer's Almost Gone*— via email who will discuss "The Haunting Case of the Bricca Murders" on Aug. 22.

In writing *Summer's Almost Gone*, Townsend was given unprecedented access to the Bricca case file, sifting through formerly sealed information that, before his book, hadn't made its way to print.

Townsend says he has been fascinated by the Bricca Murders ever since the news broke on Sept. 28, 1966, when he was 12. The murders came at a time when a serial killer dubbed the "Cincinnati Strangler" already had the city on high alert. Still, the question of who killed the Bricca family looms.

Why does the case still stick with people today? "Because it was an unbelievable crime – hideous, unexpected, baffling," says Townsend. "The victims were a workaholic husband, his alluring 'former airline stewardess' wife and their precocious fouryear-old daughter. Rumors of adultery started immediately.

"The overtones of a sexual scandal dominated the investigation 58 years ago and still resonate today. And the child victim repulsed everyone – suggesting she was murdered because she could identify a killer well-known to the family. If this crime happened today, it would certainly be profiled on *Dateline*."

According to Townsend, the key to writing Summer's Almost Gone was obtaining the Bricca case file in 2014. He had already written a chapter on the case in 2009's Queen City Gothic, but to write the book, he needed the file. Towsend says that 90 percent of that information had not yet been publicly released.

"Then the challenge was putting it all in a chronological, narrative format," says Towsend. "I also worked with a genealogist to track down and interview surviving witnesses and family members, which provided the personal, human angle to balance out the case file information."

Patrons can expect to learn about the research process and the case at Aug. 22's talk. Townsend bills the presentation as a "fascinating lecture combined with riveting PowerPoint imagery." Audiences will be taken back to 1966, a time before modern computers or DNA evidence. "Working with typewriters, shoe leather, informants and rumors, we (will) watch the investigators slowly winnow down the list of suspects and began to focus on one man in particular," says Townsend.

OTHER SPOTLIGHT SERIES DATES Aug. 15: *Sin City* – A Musical Revue

The Sin City Minstrels will perform musical numbers from the musical *Sin City*, along with sharing the story of George Ratterman, a one-time professional footballer. Born in Cincinnati, Ratterman was a record-setting quarterback whose career ran from 1947 to 1956, ending after a leg injury.

He went on to be elected as Campbell County sheriff after a bizarre campaign in which Ratterman was a victim of a failed blackmail attempt.

The library's Signature Series returns to the Carrico/Fort Thomas Branch on Friday, Sept. 6 at 7 pm. Delve into the story of legendary and infamous Cincinnati Reds player Pete Rose.

Hear from Keith O'Brien, who used interviews, FBI interviews, court records and press coverage in writing his new book **Charlie Hustle: The Rise and Fall of Pete Rose, and the Last Glory Days of Baseball**. O'Brien born and raised in Cincinnati and now living in New Hampshire—has authored four books, including **Charlie Hustle**. He has been a PEN/ESPN finalist for Literary Sportswriting, along with being longlisted for the Andrew Carnegie Medal for Excellence in Nonfiction.

Released this spring, **Charlie Hustle** was an instant *New York Times* bestseller and The *Wall Street Journal* called it "comprehensive, compulsively readable and wholly terrific." The book unravels the story of Rose, who set the still-standing record of most hits; in the '80s, he became the focal point of one of Major League Baseball's biggest scandals. Meet a Therapy Dog at Puppy Tales



If you've ever attended one of the library's Puppy Tales programs, there's a good chance you've met Koda, an AKC-accredited therapy bernedoodle who loves story time.

What exactly is a therapy pet? Love on a Leash defines a therapy animal as a "pet that is trained with its owner as a team to provide comfort and stress relief to others in a variety of situations."

Koda's handler, Amy Sloan, says her journey with therapy pets began with her first dog, who came into her family's life soon after they moved to Tennessee in 2011. They lived in a house near a lake; it was spring, and Sloan was preparing for their first big family-andfriends gathering. Her husband went down to ready a boat and returned with a surprise: a black fluffball. After no one claimed him as their own, they grew attached. (Sloan and her family now live in Greater Cincinnati.)

"I told my husband, 'If you let us keep him, I promise I will make him a therapy pet and give back to the community," recalls Sloan. "He found me for a reason and I didn't go pick him out of the pound. It was something meant to be." Sloan's first dog died from an injury after about six years. Sloan went through a grieving process, and her oldest daughter knew something was missing. That led to Koda coming to live with them in 2019.

Becoming a certified therapy pet is a year-and-a-half long process of obedience training. Though she wanted Koda to be a therapy dog from the start, Sloan says it's really not up to her as the owner.

"They have to have the right temperament," says Sloan. "They have to be able to want to go to classes, learn the obedience and be a people dog."

Koda, as history goes, took to the training swimmingly. Afterward, Sloan and Koda began visiting places like schools, nursing homes, community events and more including Campbell County Public Library!

Both the Carrico/Fort Thomas Branch and the Alexandria Branch host semi-regular Puppy Tales programs, where patrons can read a story or two to a specially-trained therapy dog. Sessions are 15 minutes. Fort Thomas features another pooch, Jasmine, along with her handler Jenney Tenney. The next Puppy Tales is from 2-4 pm on Aug. 17 at the Carrico/Fort Thomas branch. Register and staff will contact you to schedule a specific time.

"I don't get paid monetarily," says Sloan, a former special education teacher.

"I get paid in the smiles. This morning, we went to an elementary school we'd never been to before. It was a surprise; the kids didn't know we were coming... They squealed and were so excited."

The benefits of therapy depend on the population; for kids, it can be a special treat or a way to unwind from stressors. When the duo visits memory care units, Sloan says that the older adults often reminisce on happy times with past pets.

"If I get to give that stranger 10 minutes of happiness, that's all that matters," says Sloan.
